Approaches to evangelism using a structured process rather than seeing conversion as a momentary event.


Most common form: the evangelism course

Alpha is...

- Started in 1977, first published in 1993
- 27m people in 169 countries in 112 languages



...tension between Church planting and traditional parish system.






1991 Bishops standing committee working party conclusions (published in Breaking New Ground report - 1994):


- Church planting is legitimate





Mission shaped church (Church house publishing, 2004)

Subsequent publication of titles: "Mission shaped x, y, z ..."


Most influential aspects of MSC: Mixed economy concept & Fresh Expressions movement






Changes between 1994 & 2004...


From cross boundary to non boundary
 Taking into account the nature of 'networked
 society' more and more 'non-boundary'
 churches had been planted
 (i.e. Cafe Churches and Messy Churches)






Changes between 1994 & 2004...

Explosion of diversity
 Number of new church plants didn't increase significantly, however, the diversity of new forms of church being planted did increase





Changes between 1994 & 2004...

Create, don't clone
 Church planting became less about more
 churches of the same style, and more about
 new forms of church that are appropriate to
 their context

WHAT IS A FRESH EXPRESSION OF CHURCHS

- Missional: serve those outside the church (unchurched and de-churched)
- Contextual: listen to people and enter their context (church shaped by gospel <u>and</u> culture)
- Formational: make discipleship a priority
- Ecclesial: be a <u>new</u> congregation not a new way to reach people and add them to an existing congregation

The mixed economy

While he was Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams championed the concept of a "mixed economy of church"

Inherited Expressions of Church and Fresh Expressions of Church co-existing side by side...

...<u>Truly</u> resourcing each other...

Creating an Interdependent Church which is capable of reaching out to a wider range of people


- Attractive concept: vibrant churches reaching into varying contexts and subcultures
